A brief gist of the plan:

Daily 3-6 questions will be posted depending on breadth and weightage of topic. As you may be aware, there are a total of 4 sections in PSIR optional divided over 2 papers. After the completion of each section, there will be a mini mock covering syllabus of entire section; i.e., there will be mini mocks after Week 2, Week 5, Week 8 and Week 10. The syllabus being covered per day is very less (mostly 1 single topic) so that undue pressure is not created on aspirants, since they have General Studies papers to cover as well. Questions will also be covering Previous Years' UPSC Question papers and Mock tests from various coaching institutes, so that aspirants do not have to look anywhere else. Synopsis will not be posted. However, peer to peer discussion is encouraged. Any changes, if necessary, will be informed well in advance.

Sources:

The sources to be referred are left upto the aspirants' good judgement. However, the aspirants are advised to use standard books such as Andrew Heywood series, OP Gauba, Rajeev Bhargava, M. Laxmikanth, BL Fadia, VL Khanna, David Malone etc., and supplement them with Wikipedia, Quora answers, Government committee reports (ARC, Sarkaria and Punchhi), newspaper and magazine articles (The Hindu, The Indian Express, Economic & Political Weekly). Google political articles by reputed columnists like Pratap Bhanu Mehta, Ashutosh Varshney, Brahma Challaney, Srinath Raghavan etc. and read them- will be very beneficial. IGNOU materials and Shubhra Ranjan Madam's notes are also recommended.
